Minister's Message



First Impressions and Paying Attention
There is a fair amount of cliché connected with first impressions. Fortunately and unfortunately the results of the moment can impact interactions for a long time. However, there is often less paying attention going on than we would like to believe when we first meet someone. The way someone looks, how their voice sounds, the clothing they wear, who they partner with, and so on, are easy markers, but seeing these surface markers does not necessarily mean that we are paying attention.

There are two aspects of better paying attention that I believe are crucially important for Christians to reflect upon. The renowned Religious Educator and Professor, Jack Seymour, says that "paying attention is a form of interpretation."¹ He then connects this interpretation to "looking for and following the realm of God."² Paying attention to each other is at a basic sense the interpretation of relationships. It requires time and commitment to allowing each person to reveal themselves as trust is built.

But paying attention as interpretation is not just observation. It involves the purposeful prayer for one another, the working

together to address personal and societal challenges each other is facing. And maybe most fundamental, paying attention is the act of seeking and recognizing the realm of God, the very image of God, present in all of us. It is nothing short of beholding the presence of God.

I have only been with you all for but a brief moment, not nearly enough time to know you well. I am doing good if I know your first name at this point, and maybe a few tidbits about your families and personal interests. But I know that over time these connections will grow and trust will be built and rebuilt. What I can promise at the outset is that I will strive in my work and time with you to see the realm of God among us, to call on the Spirit to gather us into community, and discern ways that we might seek to recognize together the realm of God present around us.

My request is that we do this work together. May the redemptive work of Christ be known to us, and may we be transformed in ways we never would have expected. Amen

From Your Stewardship Ministry

The Stewardship Ministry (Trustees) met July 11 and the following summarizes their actions:

1. Reviewed the major maintenance and upgrade plan the congregation approved in April and determined that the items listed for the 2017 budget year are on hold for now until we have a better understanding of the budget status for the year. The Trustees are exploring payment methods and options in order to proceed with the projected plan.
2. To date, only one \$30,000 bid for the sound system was received. Trustees are pursuing more alternatives.
3. Virus and hacking protection is adequate and current for church computer system.
4. Discussed Hospice insurance response to the water repairs. No claim funds have been received to date. [One reason why the budget is strained.]
5. Approved an administration line item "Minister's Discretionary Fund" starting in the 2018 fiscal year.

6. FCC is partnering with Alaska Sound Celebration to hold a garage sale on August 19, from 8:30 – 4:00. We will also sell baked goods and lunch between 11:00 and 1:00. The Stewardship Ministry meets the second Tuesday of each month at 5:30 p.m. in the Board Room. The meeting usually lasts 1.5 to 2 hours. All are encouraged to attend.







Help for Teens in a medium they'll use...

From SNOPEs:

In September 2015, an image began circulating via social media, stating that teens could text **741741** and speak with a crisis counselor. Many viewers were skeptical about the putative program, however, since the organization behind it was not identified in the image. [So SNOPEs responded to queries about whether it was true or not.]

Nonetheless, 741741 is indeed the number for the Crisis Text Hotline (<http://www.crisistextline.org>) though the hotline is only available in the United States, not anywhere in the world. Although the image specified "teens," the number is available to anyone in crisis.

The Crisis Text Hotline also notes in their FAQ <http://www.crisistextline.org/faq> that all text messages are anonymous and free, although charges may apply with carriers other than AT&T, T-Mobile, Sprint, or Verizon.

In a June 2015 article published by the *Chicago Tribune* (<http://chicagotribune.com/business/columnists/ct-harris-crisis-text-line-0628-biz-20150626-column.html>), Nancy Lublin, the CEO of DoSomething.org, explained why she founded the Crisis Text Line.

The text message to a DoSomething.org staffer read: "He won't stop raping me. He told me not to tell anyone."

These words quickly made their way to Nancy Lublin, the CEO of the New York City-based youth empowerment group, which runs do-good campaigns by text, like initiatives for gender-neutral bathrooms and sharing tips to prevent texting while driving.

Lublin's staff had received a few messages – concerns about bullying and the like – unrelated to their campaigns, but "that one message stopped me in my tracks," Lublin said. "It was like being punched in the stomach. The first rule of marketing and sales is Go where demand is. People want this by text. We should be supplying crisis counseling by text."

That week, Lublin started building Crisis Text Line, a national 24/7 text number – 741741 – available to everyone but mostly used by teens. It went live two years later in Chicago and El Paso, Texas. Chicago was chosen because of the influence of an early funder, the Chicago-based MacArthur Foundation. El Paso was a data-driven decision based on its large Latino population.

Within four months, the line had been contacted by cellphones from every area code in America. The organization is expected to surpass 7 million messages by July of 2017, and Lublin is now in need of more counselors.
